Motorcycle Day at Moosehaven was founded in 2007 by Executive Director. John Capes. Initially proposed as another of their monthly activities, it was a small affair including staff and residents dressing in their favorite "motorcycle" shirts and sharing ice cream sundaes in the Cafeteria. There were also door prizes that included Harley Davidson merchandise. The Second Annual Motorcycle Day in 2008 was bigger and included staff on their own motorcycles. This event was held outdoors by the Life Care center and everyone enjoyed ice cream sundaes and a motorcycle parade around campus. Prizes were awarded for Best **Dressed Resident and Best** Decorated Bike or Scooter and residents enjoyed temporary "biker" tattoos. A video of this event was produced and shown at the International Convention and a number of Associations' Annual and Midyear conferences. This year, the Third Annual Motorcycle Day at Moosehaven was even larger and more successful and included residents, staff and more than 30 Moose Riders—many from the Jacksonville area. Then it was back to the Michigan House for lunch and refreshments. During this time, T-

Spotlight on Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches

Live Oak Youth Ranch Site Opens New School

Al Williams In the spring of 2009, the Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch proudly unveiled the new Donald Ralph Cooke School. With the growing number of students needing on-campus education, this welcomed addition was greatly needed to ensure their continuing education.

The new school was built through the generous donation of Mrs. Dorothy Cooke in memory of her late husband. Mr. Donald Cooke was a

believer in a strong education, which helps make a man successful. The Donald Ralph Cooke School is located adjacent to the Arts and Crafts building at the Boys Ranch campus. Students range in age from 11 to 18 years old. It offers 6th through 12th grade and employs 8 teachers and staff as well as 1 paraprofessional provided from Suwannee County Title I funding. On average, 50-55 youth attend. The school also works with Suwannee-Hamilton Vocational Technical Center to offer on-the-job training classes. Many of the boys who come to the Ranch have fallen behind their peers academically. The on-campus school allows them the opportunity improve their grades. Once a student reaches and maintains his level, he does have the opportunity to attend classes at the public school in the local community.



Class sizes are kept small so each child can have an individualized study program. The teachers have many years of experience helping youth with behavior and educational issues. The school offers a make-up program so students who work hard can graduate on time.

This fall will mark the first year at the new school. Our students are very anxious to begin classes at the new facility. Like the generous support of Mr. and Mrs. Cooke, we need your help to continue to provide the necessity for a functioning school.

Remember, a good education is the cornerstone of a productive life. You are helping children build a strong foundation for their future. Thank you for your support of our academic programs. —Niki Shaw, Creative Communications Manager, Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches

In addition to Reading, Writing and Arithmetic, there's even more going on at the Donald R. Cooke Junior/Senior High School! Our teachers and staff (along with the cottage staff) are also instilling social skills, which our students will carry with them throughout their lifetime, assuring a more successful future. Many of the following listed skills were in answer to the question posed to the students: "What social skills have you learned since you have been here?"

- Look the other person in the eyes;
- Adjust your handshake according to gender, age, and circumstance;
- Admit when you have made a mistake;
- Learn to play chess, you will need to have a strategy;
- Be a true friend:
- Be appropriate in actions and words when around a lady;
- Use your own mind and don't cheat;
- Solve the problem without fighting:
- Enter the room like a gentleman, without disruption;
- Wear your belt inside your belt loops;

- · Accept "no," and don't manipulate;
- Keep personal body functions private;
- Smile;
- Use proper body language instead of rolling your eyes when you don't agree;
- Turn in "found" items that are not yours;
- Treat school property with respect, someone sacrificed so you could benefit;
- Say the humbling words of "I'm sorry" when you are; and finally,
- Make the effort it takes to be respected.

How often do we forget some of these basic skills. What better people we can all be if we take a lesson from these children. —Peggy Mintner, Youth Ranch Secretary



Paying it Forward: Making a Difference in a Child's Life

SHADY HILLS - As a boy, Kelly Endricks never would've imagined being here surrounded by men and women in uniform with shiny badges pinned over their hearts. Not only does he stand among them on this morning at Bishop McLaughlin Catholic High School, he stands with them with his right hand firmly raised into the air, vowing to serve and protect the residents of Pasco County to the best of his ability.

...Like so many American families, Endricks' family was torn apart by divorce, his parents separating when he was 8. . . At some point, his mother remarried and Endricks had a less than civil relationship with his stepfather.

"He would beat me. He would hit me," he recalled. "Just bad stuff, mean stuff you don't want to hear."

At first Endricks, still young, would take the abuse. . . "At 15 I started fighting back,"

At 16, a Pasco deputy showed up during one of the fights, and he didn't see a troublemaker. He saw a troubled teen. The deputy mentioned to Endricks' mother there was a place that could help: The Florida Sheriffs Boys Ranch, now called the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches. . . Soon, the teen was packing his bags and on his way to the ranch in Live Oak.

The move changed his life...Before he went to the ranch, he made an agreement with his mother that if after four months he didn't like it, he could go home. . . He stayed two years. . Endricks treasures all he learned at the ranch.

"When I left there I was a self-sufficient person," he said.

At the Live Oak ranch he learned about teamwork, integrity, discipline, honesty, helping others, working with his hands and even how to do his own laundry and to

He went back home to Pasco at 18 and got a job at a local materials company, working

his way up to operations manager. He married 13 years ago and he and wife Kimberly have two children, daughter Brittany, 10, and son Jonathan, 6. But a few years ago, he got an itch to make a career change in his life, to make it more fulfilling.

"I wanted to help people out," he said. In the past couple of years, he has earned his GED diploma and graduated from the police academy at Pasco-Hernando Community College. When he graduated, he applied to become a deputy at the Pasco County Sheriff's Office but there were no open positions at the time. He was hired by Dade City Police in May 2008.

In a small, private ceremony in the patrol room, the chief swore in Endricks and one other officer and pinned on their badges. "It was like an overwhelming feeling that came over me," Endricks recalled of the moment. "It was the hairs-raised-on-myneck kind of a deal."

He felt the same thing Wednesday, especially since he was determined to become a Pasco deputy.

Endricks says there's never been a day he regretted going to the ranch.

"All this stuff never would have happened had I not gone to the Florida Boys Ranch," he said. He's been working at the sheriff's office since May and has nearly completed his training

Recently, he went out to a domestic battery call and found a 15-year-old girl had been hit by her 25-year-old sister for not doing enough chores, Endricks said. As he talked to the teen, he learned her parents had recently divorced and she was having a hard time with it and had started acting out. He told her about the youth ranches. He doesn't know whether she'll follow through, he said, but she was asking a lot of questions.

Endricks stood there in his uniform that day and told her about himself.

SAFETY HARBOR YOUTH RANCH

The Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranch in Safety Harbor was the third residential child care program established by the Florida Sheriffs Youth Ranches, Inc. In early 1975, the Youth Ranches was still searching for the means to launch a coeducational program - a facility which would allow brothers and sisters to stay together as they worked out their problems -

later that same year, the lengthy search ended.

In the winter months of 1975, Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Salls donated several cattle to the Youth Ranches and, later, promised to give their large home and land. With a few minor renovations to the Salls' residence, the first cottage was ready to accept siblings in August of 1978.

The Youth Ranch campus consists of an administration building, tennis courts, multi- purpose activity center, swimming pool, maintenance building, chapel and three cottages. The Youth Ranch has the capacity for 30 youth in three spacious cottages.

Through the generosity and support of many friends, the Youth Ranches is able to continue to help children and families throughout the state of Florida.


generate more charitable and community awareness activities.

Hazards of the open road





NOT YOURS, of course.

You already know about checking your air

pressure when the tire is cool and how important it is that you check air pressures

often. After all, you have to take care of your tires – because they are the major equipment between you and the road – and you only have two.

What about the other guy?

But what if you have eighteen? Is each tire as important to you? Maybe, if it's your vehicle. Maybe not if it's a company vehicle or the owner just trying to get more out of his dollar. After all, there are seventeen more to take that extra load, even if just for a few minutes. Be aware that in the current economy many drivers of all types of vehicles are not getting new tires as often as they are needed. Drivers are trying to get more out of all of their equipment, including tires. They may also run heavier loads on lighter-rated tires than before because those tires are less expensive.

What does that have to do with me?

Where is all of this going? As a motorcyclist, it is always important to be aware of your surroundings on the road. You're always having to look out for people who aren't paying attention—riding around in their cages, chatting on their cell phones, drinking coffee—also potholes, road debris, and animals. Now it's important that you take one more factor into consideration.

What else can happen?

As you pass the lawn maintenance trailer with three lawnmowers on it in town, or the semitractor and trailer on the interstate, give them a little more room. You don't know when that vehicle will experience a blowout or spit some other debris off. A blowout can be devastating to a rider passing beside the affected tire. If exploding debris doesn't get you, the gator might!



Look out for flying objects--don't assume that a load is secure.

In the end it's up to you.

Following a car or trailer, remember that they can straddle a problem in the road—like pieces of a blown tire—and if you are following too closely, you won't have time to react.

Unsecured cargo can blow out of a truck or trailer and come sailing toward the following rider at an amazing speed.

Enjoy the road, stay sharp, and ride safe! --Frankie O'Harrow, South Carolina

Madge Phillips Center for the Homeless Cedar Rapids, Iowa

The Waypoint Madge Phillips Center provides stabilizing resources for homeless and near-homeless women and their children. The Center's goal is to offer basic needs, information, strategic referrals, support, and skill development so women can achieve and maintain self-sufficiency and family stability.

The Waypoint Madge Phillips Center offers 24-hour shelter for homeless women and their children. The Center maintains 16 bedrooms, sharing a kitchen, two living areas, children's playroom, laundry room, computer work stations and private meeting spaces. Women and children can live in the shelter for up to 90 days. The atmosphere is safe, supportive, yet structured to help clients achieve their goals of independence and self-sufficiency. The Center also offers a daytime drop-in program on Monday - Friday, from 9a.m. - 3p.m. to provide women and children with access to basic needs such as a hot meal, shower, laundry facilities, newspapers, telephone, food, diapers and other toiletries.

The case management service model helps women identify, prioritize and resolve problems to improve their situations.

A post-shelter outreach specialist provides a continuation of case management services in women's homes to assist with working toward goal achievement for up to one year after departing from The Waypoint Madge Phillips Center.

The Waypoint Madge Phillips Center provides one-on-one support, peer support and group support for homeless and near-homeless women. In addition, Waypoint offers the same services to women and children who are victims of domestic violence.

An on-site child advocate assesses and supports the needs of each child living at The Waypoint Madge Phillips Center and provides positive interaction and planned activities during their stay.

hours from Hagerstown. Total mileage on the motorcycle for the trip was 1,631.7 miles. Miles for contributions, however, remain 1,572 miles.


It was a great run, Mike O'Harrow, President of the South Carolina Moose Riders joined us just north of Florence, SC, and rode with us to
